## Description

The R1Q2A3636 is a 1,048,576-word by 36-bit, the R1Q2A3618 is a 2,097,152-word by 18-bit, and the R1Q2A3609 is a 4,194,304-word by 9-bit synchronous quad data rate static RAM fabricated with advanced CMOS technology using full CMOS six-transistor memory cell. It integrates unique synchronous peripheral circuitry and a burst counter. All input registers controlled by an input clock pair (K and /K) and are latched on the positive edge of K and /K. These products are suitable for applications which require synchronous operation, high speed, low voltage, high density and wide bit configuration. These products are packaged in 165-pin plastic FBGA package.

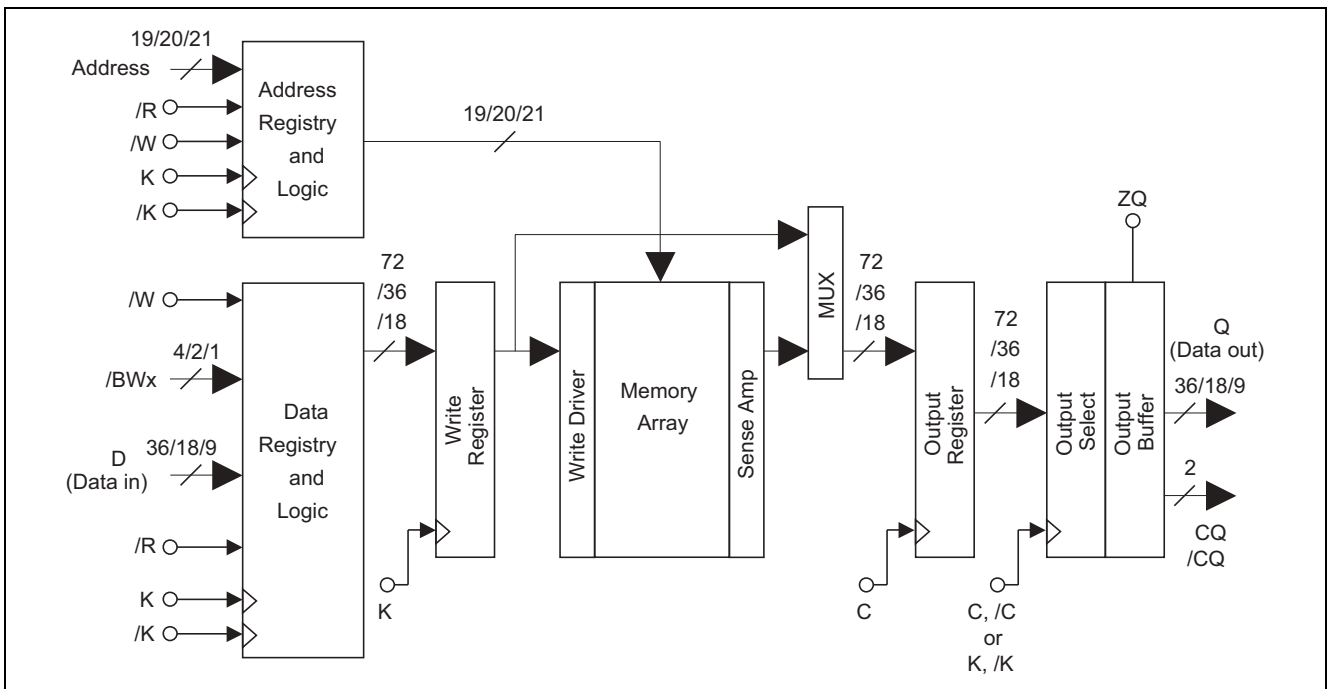
## Pin Description

Name	I/O type	Descriptions	Notes
SA	Input	Synchronous address inputs: These inputs are registered and must meet the setup and hold times around the rising edge of K for READ cycles and must meet the setup and hold times around the rising edge of /K for WRITE cycles. All transactions operate on a burst-of-two words (one clock period of bus activity). These inputs are ignored when device is deselected.	
/R	Input	Synchronous read: When low, this input causes the address inputs to be registered and a READ cycle to be initiated. This input must meet setup and hold times around the rising edge of K.	
/W	Input	Synchronous write: When low, this input causes the address inputs to be registered and a WRITE cycle to be initiated. This input must meet setup and hold times around the rising edge of K.	
/BW <sub>x</sub>	Input	Synchronous byte writes: When low, these inputs cause their respective byte to be registered and written during WRITE cycles. These signals must meet setup and hold times around the rising edges of K and /K for each of the two rising edges comprising the WRITE cycle. See Byte Write Truth Table for signal to data relationship.	
K, /K	Input	Input clock: This input clock pair registers address and control inputs on the rising edge of K, and registers data on the rising edge of K and the rising edge of /K. /K is ideally 180 degrees out of phase with K. All synchronous inputs must meet setup and hold times around the clock rising edges. These balls cannot remain V <sub>REF</sub> level.	
C, /C	Input	Output clock: This clock pair provides a user-controlled means of tuning device output data. The rising edge of /C is used as the output timing reference for first output data. The rising edge of C is used as the output timing reference for second output data. Ideally, /C is 180 degrees out of phase with C. C and /C may be tied high to force the use of K and /K as the output reference clocks instead of having to provide C and /C clocks. If tied high, C and /C must remain high and not to be toggled during device operation. These balls cannot remain V <sub>REF</sub> level.	
/DOFF	Input	DLL disable: When low, this input causes the DLL to be bypassed for /DOFF Input stable, low frequency operation.	
ZQ	Input	Output impedance matching input: This input is used to tune the device outputs to the system data bus impedance. Q and CQ output impedance are set to $0.2 \times RQ$ , where RQ is a resistor from this ball to ground. This ball can be connected directly to V <sub>DDQ</sub> , which enables the minimum impedance mode. This ball cannot be connected directly to V <sub>SS</sub> or left unconnected.	
TMS TDI	Input	IEEE1149.1 test inputs: 1.8 V I/O levels. These balls may be left not TMS Input connected if the JTAG function is not used in the circuit.

## General Description

### Power-up and Initialization Sequence

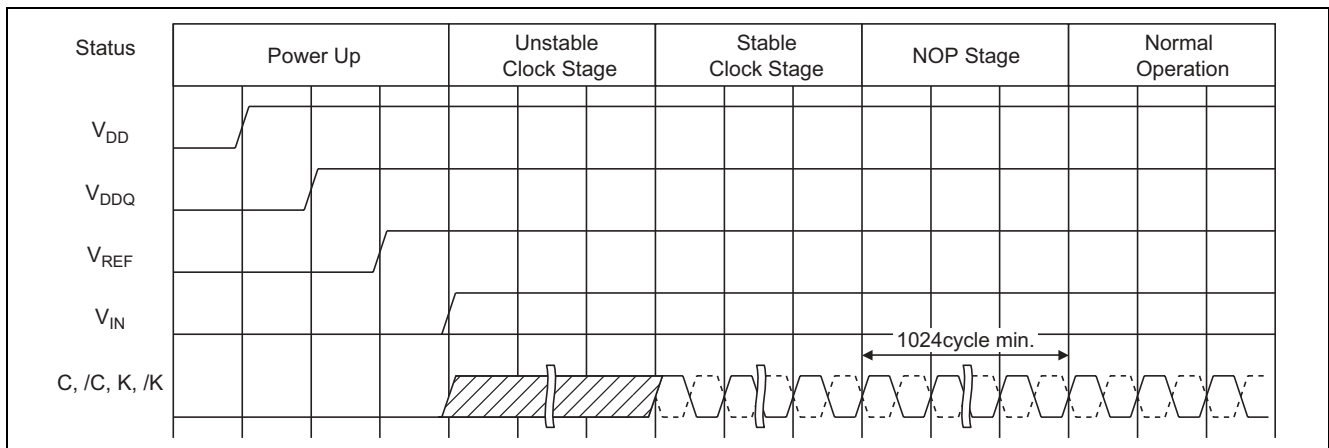
The following supply voltage application sequence is recommended:  $V_{SS}$ ,  $V_{DD}$ ,  $V_{DDQ}$ ,  $V_{REF}$  then  $V_{IN}$ .

After the stable power, there are three possible sequences.

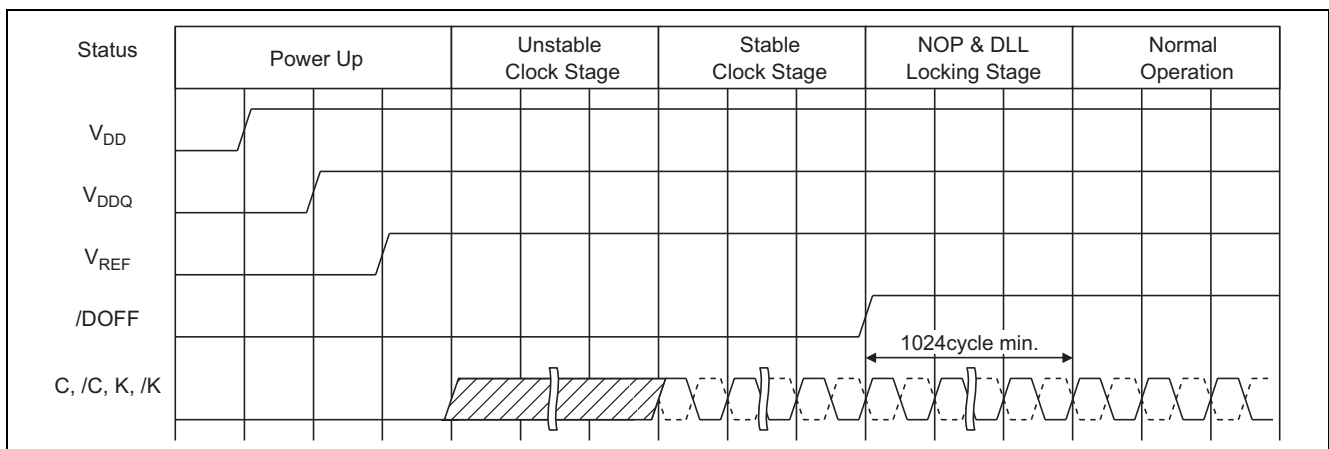
1. Sequence when DLL disable (/DOFF pin fixed low)
  - Just after the stable power and clock (K, /K, C, /C), 1024 NOP cycles (min.) are required for all operations, including JTAG functions, to become normal.
- 2a. Sequence controlled by /DOFF pin when DLL enable
  - Just after the stable power and clock (K, /K, C, /C), take /DOFF to be high.
  - The additional 1024 NOP cycles (min.) are required to lock the DLL and for all operations to become normal.
- 2b. Sequence controlled by Clock (/DOFF pin fixed high) when DLL enable
  - If /DOFF pin is fixed high with unstable clock, the clock (K, /K, C, /C) must be stopped for 30ns (min.).
  - During stop clock stage, C pin must tie low for 30 ns (min.). C, /C, K and /K cannot remain  $V_{REF}$  level.
  - The additional 1024 NOP cycles (min.) are required to lock the DLL and for all operations to become normal.

- Notes:
1. After K or C clock is stopped, clock recovery cycles (1024 NOP cycles (min.)) are required for read/write operations to become normal.
  2. When DLL is enable and the operating frequency is changed, DLL reset should be required again. After DLL reset again, the 1024 NOP cycles (min.) are needed to lock the DLL.

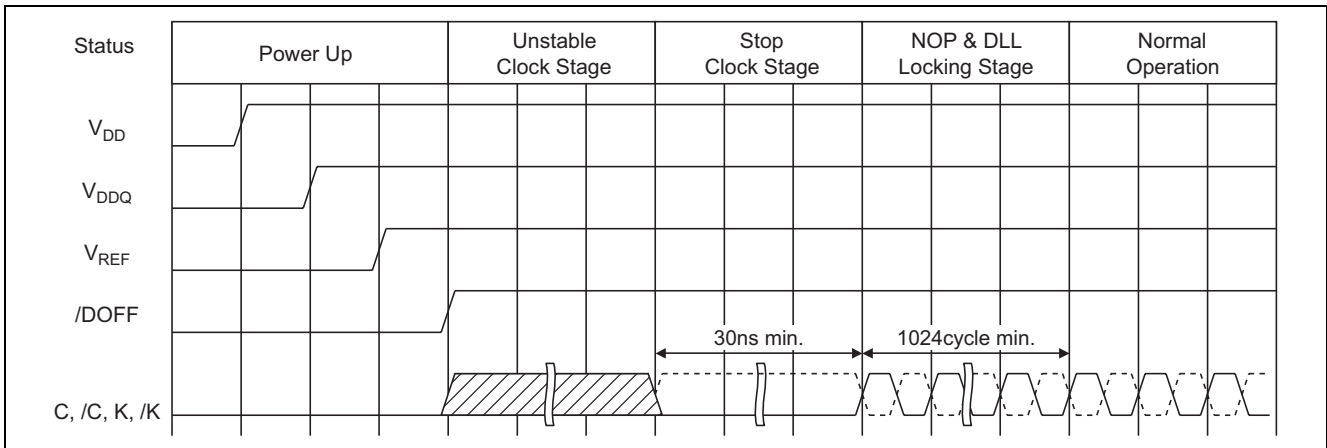
#### 1. Sequence when DLL disable (/DOFF pin fixed low)

**DLL Constraints**

1. DLL uses either K or C clock as its synchronizing input, the input should have low phase jitter which is specified as TKC var.
2. The lower end of the frequency at which the DLL can operate is 100MHz.

**Programmable Output Impedance**

1. Output buffer impedance can be programmed by terminating the ZQ ball to V<sub>SS</sub> through a precision resistor (R<sub>Q</sub>). The value of R<sub>Q</sub> is five times the output impedance desired. The allowable range of R<sub>Q</sub> to guarantee impedance matching with a tolerance of 10% is 250 Ω typical.  
The total external capacitance of ZQ ball must be less than 7.5 pF.

4. This device contains circuitry that will ensure the outputs will be in high-Z during power-up.

6. When clocks are stopped, the following cases are recommended; the case of K = low, /K = high, C = low and /C = high, or the case of K = high, /K = low, C = high and /C = low. This condition is not essential, but permits most rapid restart by overcoming transmission line charging symmetrically.

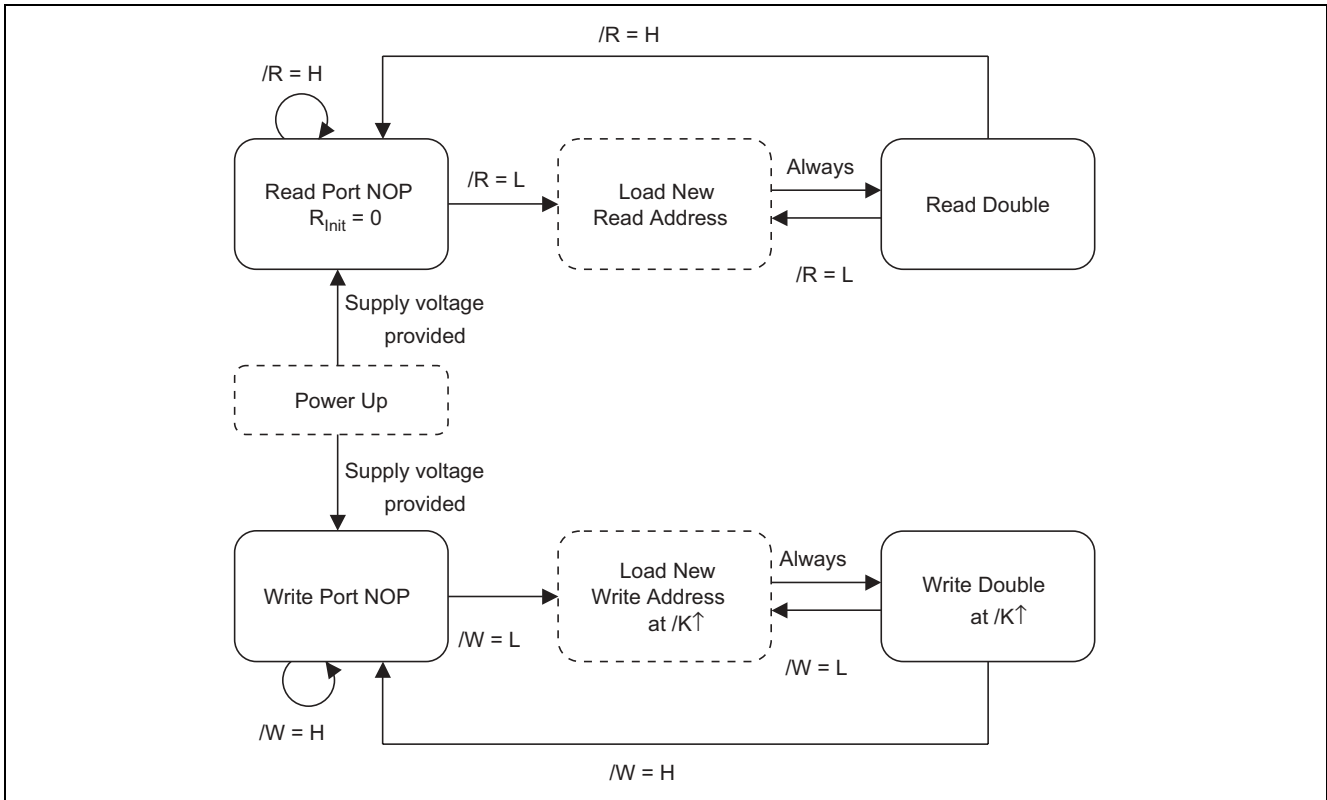

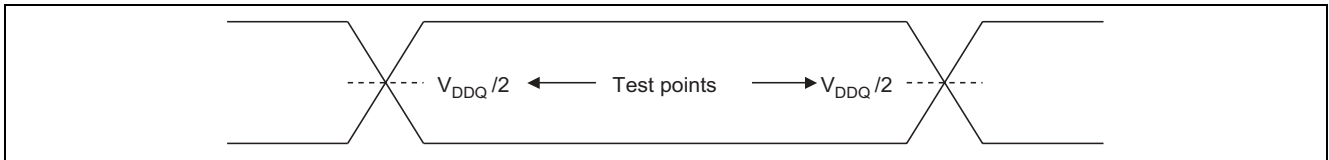

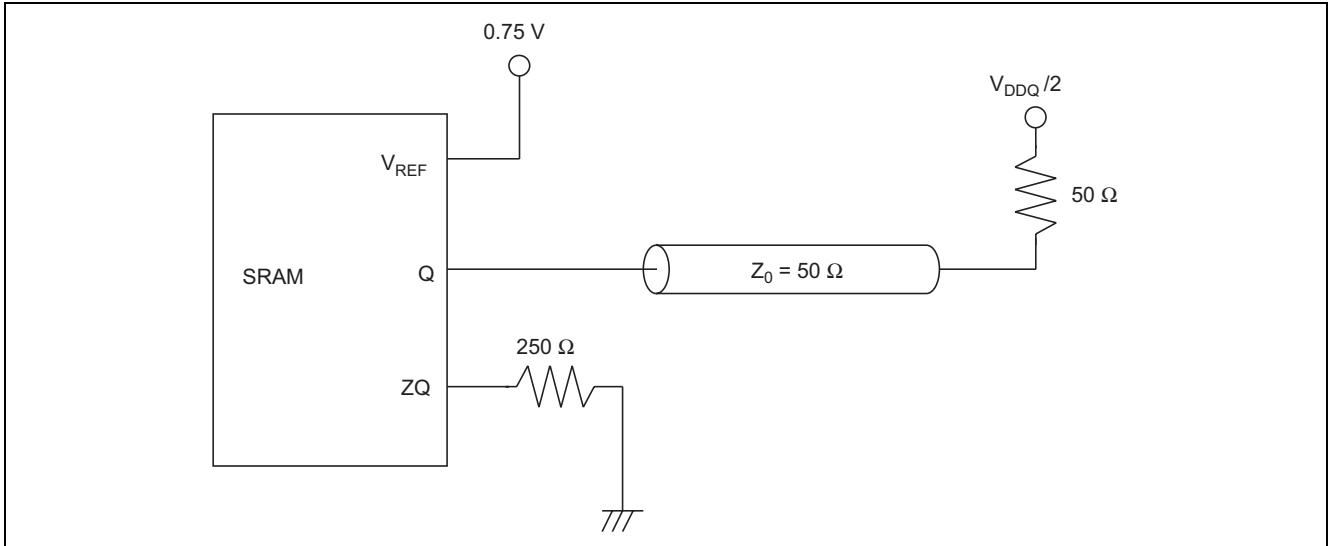
#### Input waveform (Rise/fall time $\leq 0.3 \text{ ns}$ )

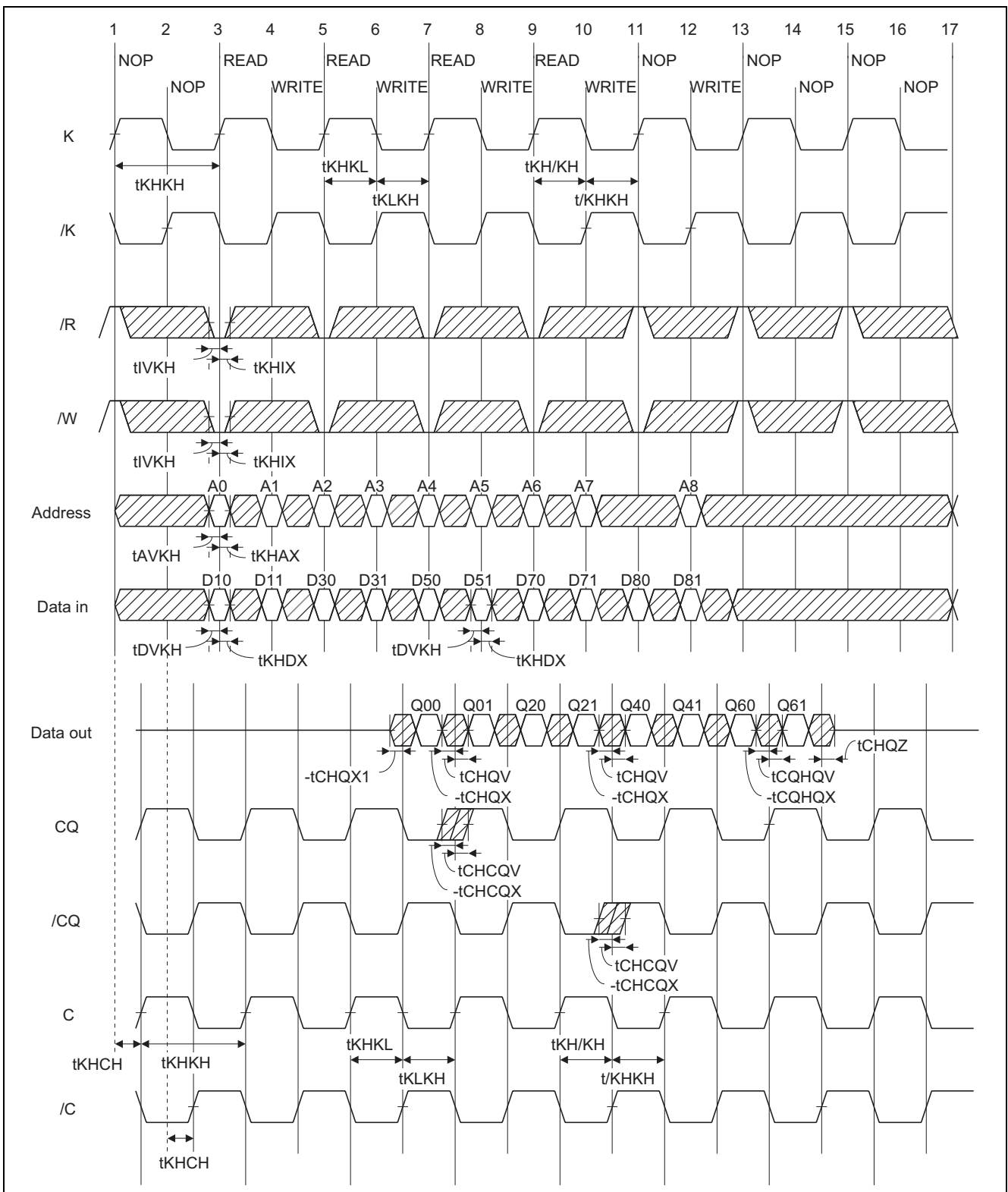

It is possible to use this device without utilizing the TAP. To disable the TAP controller without interfering with normal operation of the device, TCK must be tied to  $V_{SS}$  to preclude mid level inputs. TDI and TMS are designed so an undriven input will produce a response identical to the application of a logic 1, and may be left unconnected. But they may also be tied to  $V_{DD}$  through a 1k $\Omega$  resistor. TDO should be left unconnected.

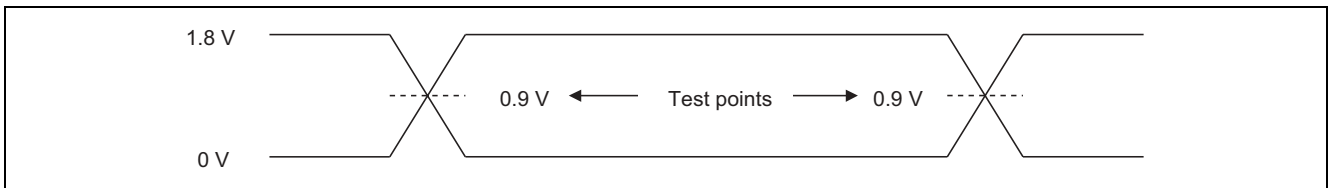

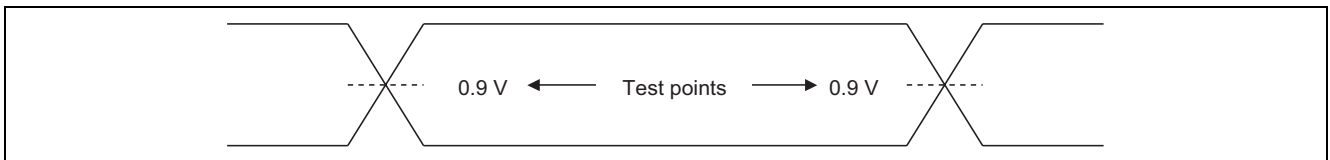

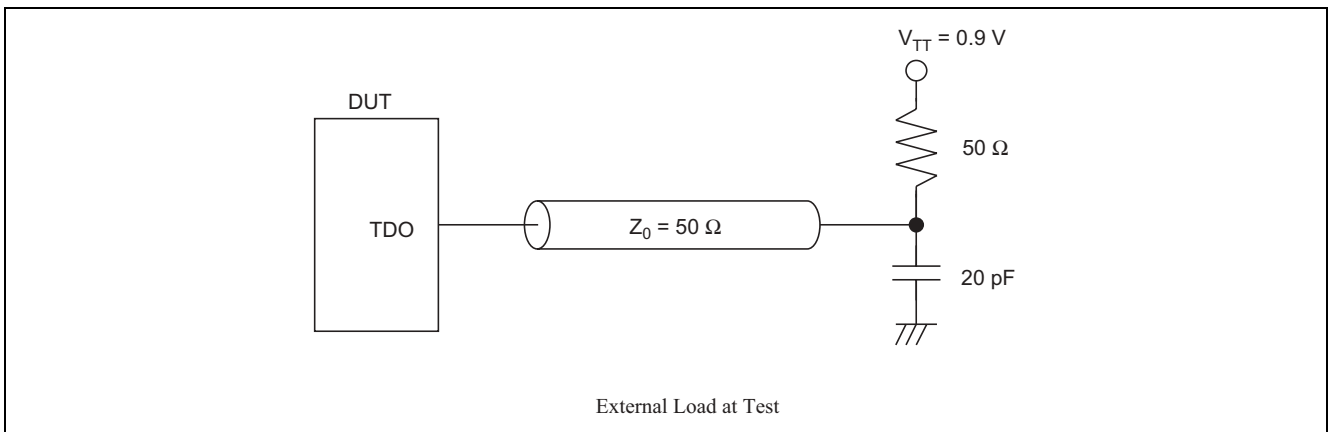
#### Input waveform

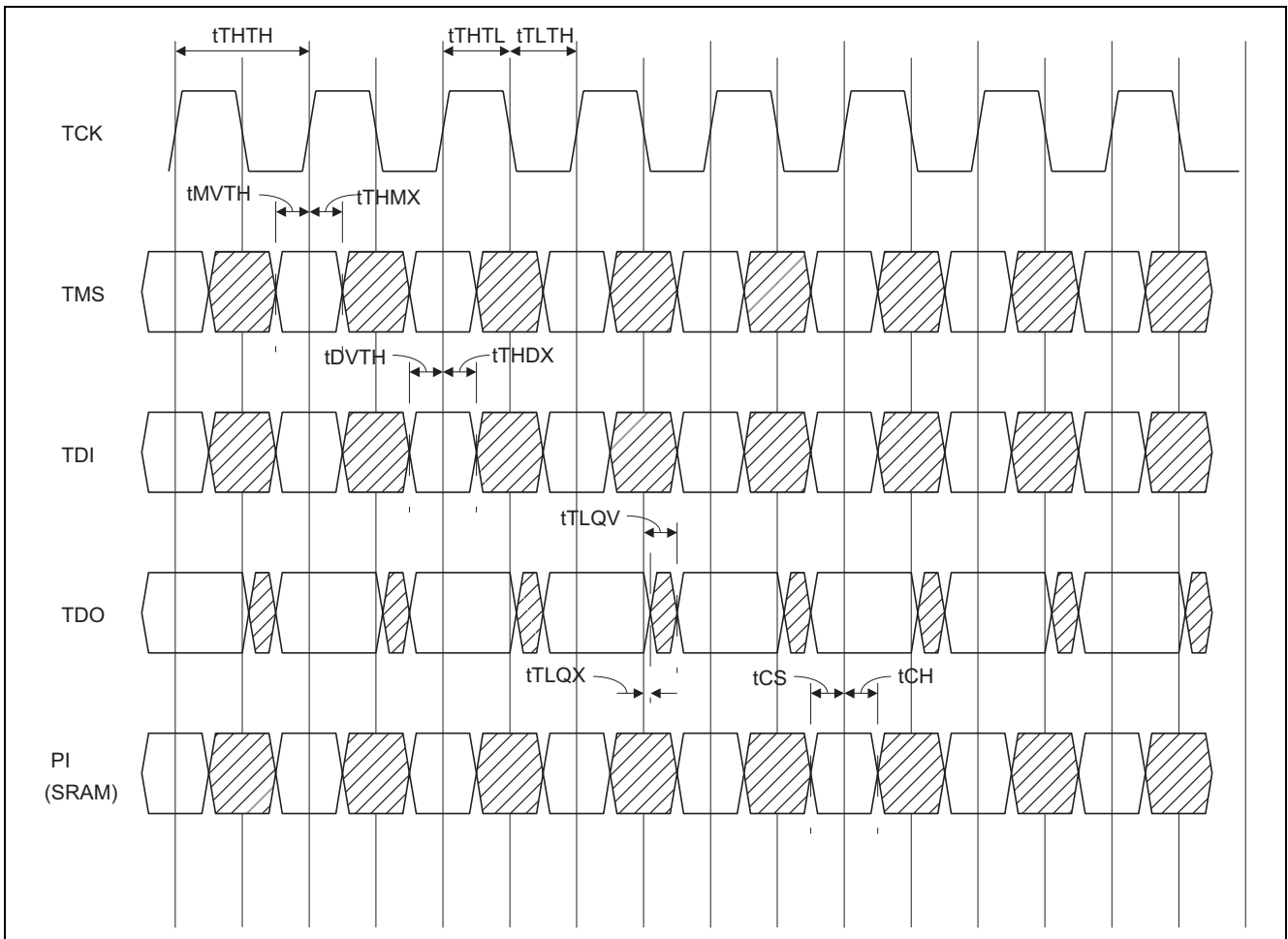

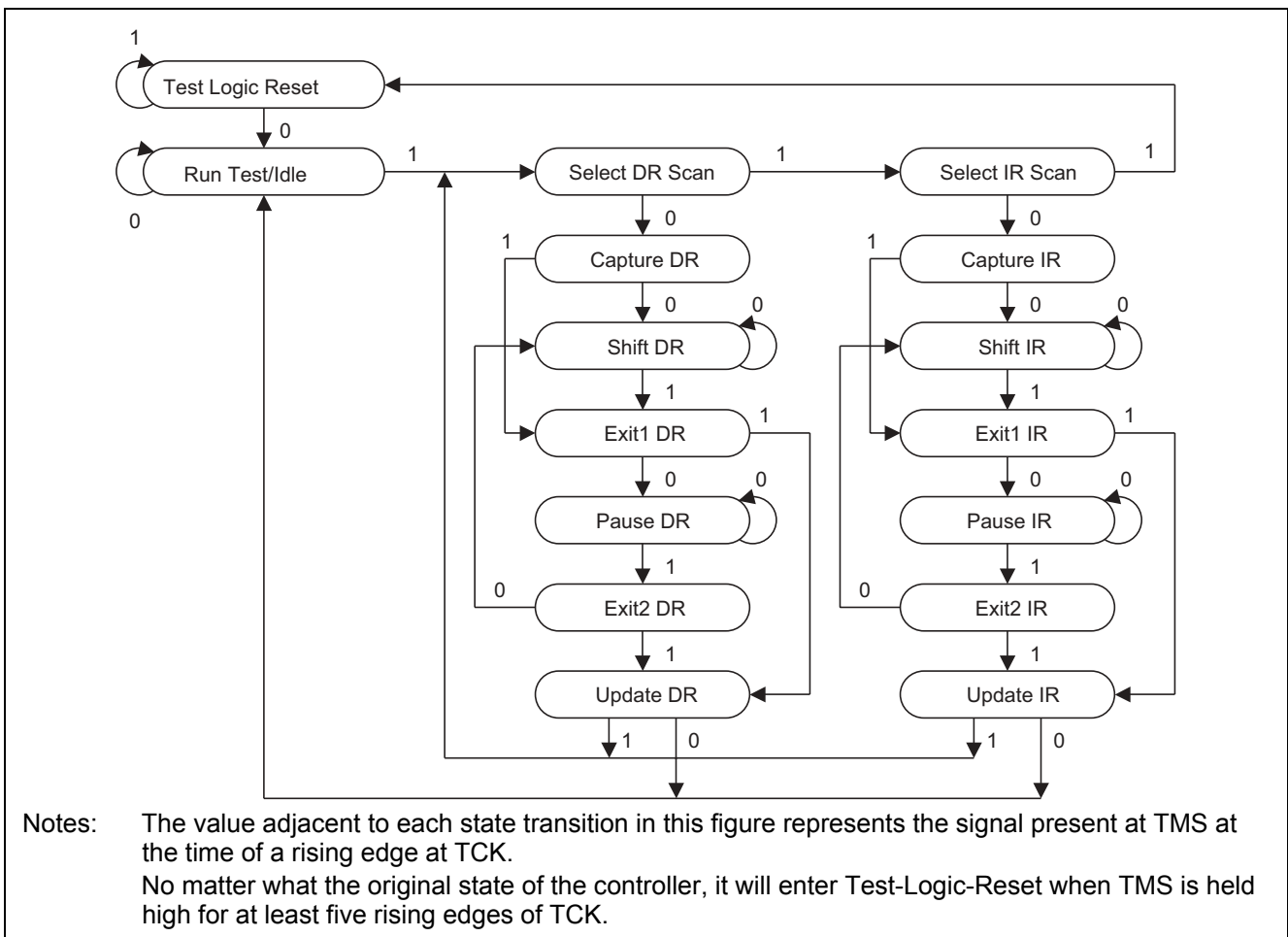

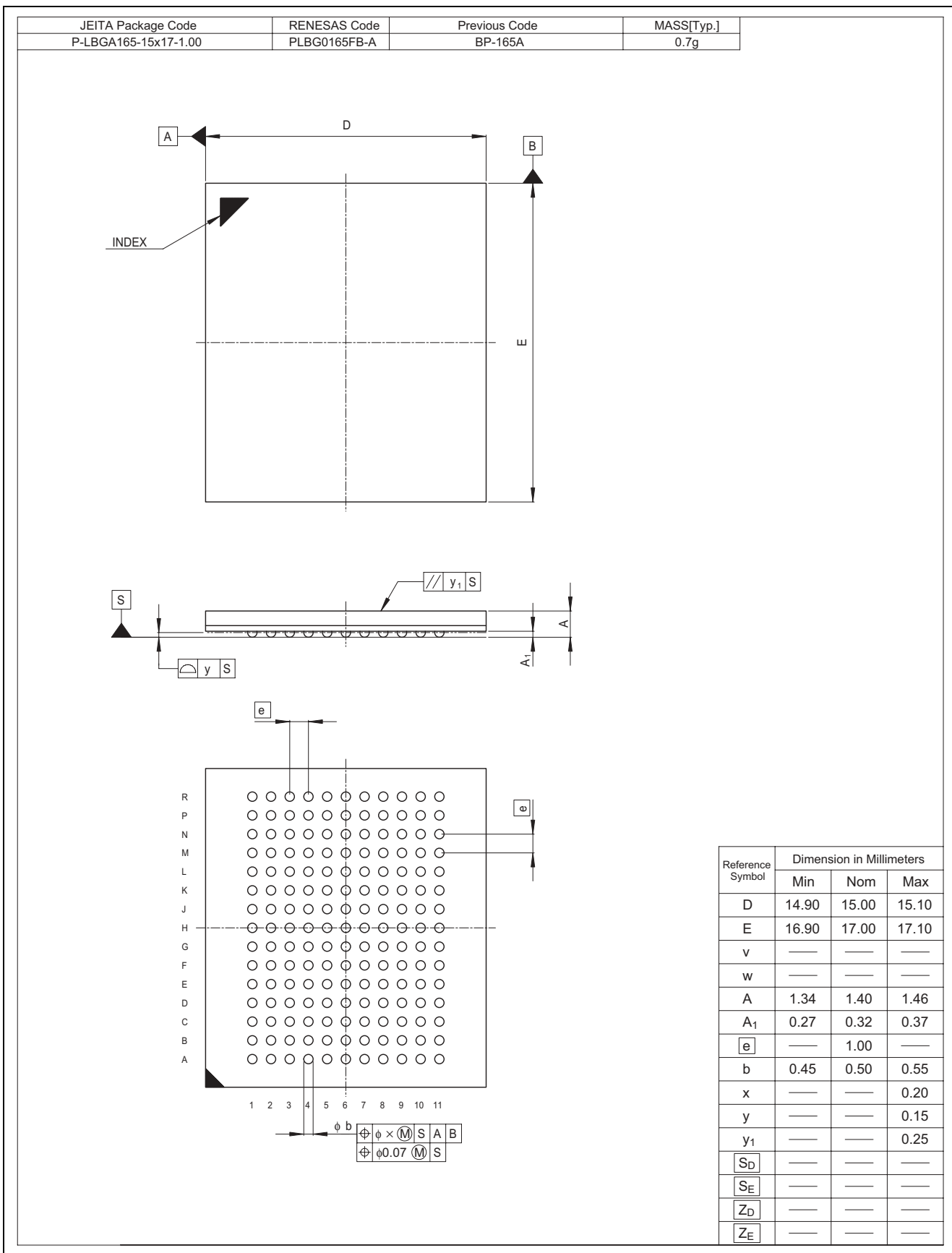
